**PROGRAMS: GLOCALIZERS WITH CARTHANS AND THEMED INITIATIVES WITH CARTHA FELLOWS**

Mobilizing resources for Carthans across disciplines, sectors, regions, cultures, and ages, CARTHA inspires non-hierarchical Aspirations Exchanges that creatively shape the landscapes for the practice of Collaborative Doing. CARTHA’s educational programs—based on the **C2G2 model: Building Collaborative Competence in Multi-sector Partnerships for Glocal Good**—provide a conduit for spurring innovative thought, community outreach, and cross-sector partnerships. *Glocalizer* forums and themed initiatives emphasize the social dimensions that influence and affect the human collaborative spirit indispensable in humanitarian endeavors.

Partnering with professional societies, campuses, social service clubs, philanthropies, and NGOs, CARTHA has organized, led, or sponsored symposia and events reaching over 7,000 faculty, students, and professionals to connect Carthans into broader networks and deliver targeted programs efficiently. Based on discussions with over 700 individuals in our pursuits to provide models for understanding, facilitating, and communicating the work of *Carthans*, we present below our **2014-2019 Strategic Framework**.

Focused Efforts	Envisioned Activities and Outcomes
<b>Operations</b> 	Establish endowment for CARTHA’s operations for the longer term. Based on resource availability, hire managerial/program staff; produce Oral Histories/StoryMaps; and optimize administrative efficiencies by using cost-effective technology infrastructure to overcome resource constraints.
<b>Glocalizers &amp; Partners</b> 	Organize and co-sponsor in-person and online Glocalizer forums to identify <i>Carthans</i> (including ~5 CARTHA Fellows each year), mobilize resources, and expand support for programming models such as <b>The Derek Project</b> for <u>Collaborative Literacy</u> ; <b>Rotaract</b> partnership and <b>Winterim India</b> experiential learning programs for <u>Collaborative Learning</u> ; Social/Technological Bridging Innovations Symposia for <u>Collaborative Dialogues</u> ; and CARTHA Initiatives (see below) for <u>Collaborative Doing</u> .
<b>Initiatives</b> 	<p><b>MODERNITY MEETS CENTURIES-OLD STIGMA: TECHNOLOGY FOR SOCIAL INTEGRATION OF LEPROSY AFFECTED PERSONS</b> is a 55-year vision aiming for total elimination of leprosy (or Hansen’s disease). Leprosy is a highly curable disease. Yet, there are still 14 remaining countries of disease endemicity.
